AV Festival is an international festival of electronic arts featuring visual art, music and moving image. The artist and designer is **Ryota Kuwakubo**

Ryota is a Japanese artist and designer who's work fuses technology, function and aesthetic *. He creates work which are simple, but provocative and take the form of spaces, sculptures and jewellery. Because he makes devices, he is sometimes known as a device artist.

“Prepared Radios”

Prepared Radios are handmade and programmed to extract only consonant sounds from the broadcast. A consonant is a sound, the idea being that consonants don't sound on their own, but only occur with a nearby vowel.

The word consonant is also used to refer to letters of an alphabet that denote a consonant sound. It's the opposite of a vowel. Vowels are **A, E, I, O** and **U**. Consonants are all of the other letters.

A way to remember this ‘**CONSON**ants **CONSTR**ict the air flow’. **VOWELS** on the other hand, are characterised by how they **SHAPE** the sound, by positioning of the tongue and shape of the mouth, but **WITHOUT** severely constricting the air flow.

Consonant letters in the English alphabet are **B, C, D, F, G, H, J, K, L, M, N, P, Q, R, S, T, V, W, X, Z**, and sometimes **Y** - the letter **Y** stands for a consonant in the word “yoke” but for a vowel in “myth”, for example.

Ryota has designed the radios to filter out the sound of the vowels, the result is unsettling and very strange. All meaning and information is removed, only breath remains: a human essence. We only live because we breathe.

“Prepared Radios”

Sometimes when we are listening to the radio, there is too much going on, too much information and too much noise. Ryota has taken away some of the sounds and gives your ear and mind a rest from what you normally hear. But, because he has filtered out the vowels, you can only hear the consonants. This creates an unfamiliar and strange sound. You can not process what you hear because parts are missing. This might make you curious, it might make you uncomfortable.

Ryota says that his work is all about observing the world of innovation. He is interested in how new technologies change the way we live and behave, for example the mobile phone used in public places when telephone conversations used to be in our private spaces.

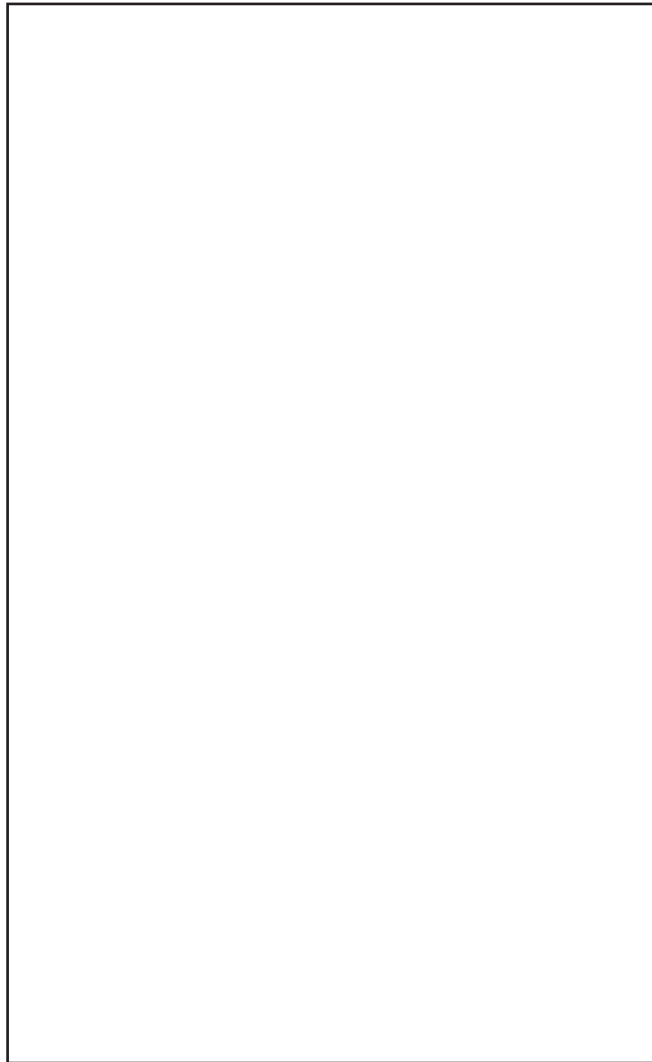
With the radio project, he is observing how sounds are made with consonants and vowels to create words we understand and has taken this away by removing part of the way that we talk. It's like trying to read a book with lots of the words blanked out. It frustrates us a bit because we want to hear what we recognise. This makes us feel secure. The prepared radios make us feel differently though. These radios are all hand made.

Ryota is a designer, so it is important that he designed and made the radios.

Look at the different radio designs that Ryota has made. They are strong geometrical shapes. Can you come up with some ideas for designs which are **different** from the ones you see, but which would fit in with the ones in the gallery space? Use the boxes to draw out your design ideas.




